It is a gloomy Sunday dawn in Wisconsin; the 19th is passed now for me for this year. It is cloudy, raining, with some early morning lightning to boot. The robins and red winged black birds are back, and the neat sounds of the sand hill cranes have filled the skies and marshes. It is the signs of renewal on this journey of our lives.

I lost my dad of 96½ years old on Feb. 27, he lived a long life, being born less than 50 years after the end of the Civil War. A humble man who had many different jobs over his lifetime, he was always working at something. In his 80's was still working at the church. I don't remember him ever drawing unemployment. He worked as a young man during the great depression in a CCC Corp in northern Wisconsin planting a million trees and building bridges for \$1 a day and had to send home \$25 a month to his folks. 1934 era, like many of our fathers, they made a lot of sacrifices. I thank everyone who sent me a card on behalf of losing my dad.

We also lost another great supporter of B Co., Margaret Zeier, March 8, who along with her late husband, Norb, made many beautiful quilts which they donated to our past reunions. B Co., gave a beautiful arrangement of flowers, which the family deeply acknowledged to me to forward to the Bravo Co. Regulars. My dad and Margaret are on their journey, which many before us have gone on. So life goes on...but to those who truly believe, this is not the end.

Now tomorrow March 21st, I can't avoid the memories of 44 years ago. I have to work on processing those memories so I can move forward with my life in a normal manner. I recommend a book for all guys, gals and family members that has helped me more than any physiologist. It is called Tears of a Warrior, by E Anthony and Janet J. Searhorn. I believe it is free from the VA. He, Anthony, was a helicopter pilot in Vietnam,. He didn't go through exactly what us grunts did, but much of his PTSD is the same. As I looked in the dictionary on how to spell physiologist, I noticed pianist on the same page. Now what's pianist have to do with physiologist? The key to that answer is, to note what the pianist has to say about what plays such an important part of ones' life. You can only control your own actions, you can't control the actions of anyone else. Some of the best advice I've ever received in life.

You guys and gals who have met me at reunions know I can be emotional and I'm not ashamed of that, for even Jesus was emotional when his friend Lazarus died, and I am not nearly as strong a person as Jesus was when he was here on earth.

The sound, smell and feel of spring is in the air here in the Great State of Wisconsin as Joe Shields would say. Easter is on the horizon, something to look forward to, we can celebrate the gift Christ gave us, freedom of sin and everlasting life, oh what a guy!

I'm talking about Jesus, March 20, 2011, and guess who calls me? Richard Crazy Ward! He says remember Soui Tre 1967, and remember Ted, we are all brothers. Quite a statement, especially when I was just writing to everyone else about Jesus. Coincidence, maybe?? I'm still amazed today how the good Lord works in such mysterious ways.

It is the morning of March 21 now, today a lot better than 44 years ago. 8:50 here overcast like it was that day in 1967, but no jets scraping over the tree tops above our heads, just two big cranes down by the pond picking around. I wonder what my ol medic friend, Bill Schamus, down in Georgia is doing. On March 19, 1967, when I was holding a dying, Loius Sass, in my arms and calling for a medic, Bill was the guy who came through explosions and fire to help me with Louis and never received any medal. How could that happen? Over 1200 medics died in the Vietnam war, that is like 2% of the total lost in the Vietnam war. Bill can hold his head high for I know how brave he was, medals or no medals, a mere shadow of Christ.

I look forward to this Easter season, Sunday, April 24, with a dream. That we will have a new holiday called Mother Teresa Day, to honor her, for all the things she has done for all. No matter what color your skin is. She is our intercessor to God. Like Jesus dying on the cross, she died honoring His name and Memory. Deeds not words.

"The statue was created by an Iraqi artist named Kalat, who for years was forced by Saddam Hussein to make the many hundreds of bronze busts of Saddam that dotted Baghdad.

Kalat was so grateful for the American's liberation of his country; he melted three of the heads of the fallen Saddam and made the statue as a memorial to the American soldiers and their fallen warriors. Kalat worked on this memorial night and day for several months.

To the left of the kneeling soldier is a small Iraqi girl giving the soldier comfort as he mourns the loss of his comrade in arms."

I arrived in Vietnam in March, 1970. My first time out was to FSB Washington about three miles from where FSB Crook was, which had been torn down. We pulled security for the 1st of the 5th Mechanized Unit which had made a probe into Cambodia. They waited until the next day when a mobile portable bridge mounted on three tracked vehicles came to forge the river. As we patrolled, we didn't realize it was a forerunner of operations to invade Cambodia, which we did in May, 1970. When we came out of Cambodia, we were reassigned to the other side of Nui Ba Den at Dau Tieng at FSB Kien across the river from the Boi Loi, straight Edge and Hobo Woods. Then to FSB Lynch. Though many nights stand out in the Vietnam War, those of June 6-8, 1969, are still exceptional. Perhaps the most lopsided casualty-producing battle of the war occurred over these three evenings of incredible combat. Firebase Crook was located 10 miles east of the Cambodian border and 13 miles from Tay Ninh. It was occupied by B Co., 3rd Bn., 22nd Inf., 25th Div.; the 4.2-inch mortar platoon and radar section of E Company; elements of the 125th Signal Company; and a battery of the 7th Bn., 11th Artillery. In all, there were up to 225 men there. When the first barrage hit at 3 a.m., one soldier was KIA by a mortar round as a listening post was pulled in. He was the only American fatality of the entire engagement. The defenders were hit with the full force of the 272nd North Vietnamese Army (NVA) Regiment. But the Communists were mostly (16 breached the wire) stopped short of the perimeter by artillerymen who lowered their tubes and fired point-blank into the ranks of the enemy. Those NVA left exposed were annihilated by AC-47 and AC-119 gunships. The second attack was preceded by a 90-minutee shelling. FSB Crook was hit with 150 rockets and mortar shells a minute. Yet only three GI's were wounded. The two battalions of the assaulting 88th NVA Regiment were decimated. Surrounding fields were strewn with hundreds of dead Communists. A third attempt at breaching the perimeter was half-hearted and quickly stopped in its tracks. A, C and D companies of the 3rd Battalion finally broke through on the third day to relieve the besieged Americans and drive off the attackers. David Cuellar, who served in the Radar Section of E Company, recalled: "We were totally surrounded and cut off. The NVA had been ordered to eliminate the fire base because it posed an imminent threat to their infiltration routes. Had it not been for artillery and air support, we no doubt would have been overrun. After the battle, we gathered up over 750 enemy dead. Most of the dead had green sisal ropes tied around their necks to facilitate dragging their bodies away to hide the real body count." (The NVA KIA count varies, depending on source. Another figure mentioned is 402 killed.)
