Earl in April I received a call from Salvadore "Shorty" Guiterrez saying that he'd received calls identifying some of those whose names he'd forgotten. Then I received e-mails from Michael Sanders giving me a lead for the brigade photographer whom I wasn't able to find, John Kapior sent me a large amount of material which I was able to use, and, after the fact, Terry Shipley has promised to send me his pictures of the battlefield.

As far as the presentation itself, it went very well thanks the help of those mentioned above. It was a portion of the participants' part in a week long seminar led by distinguished faculty conducted as an alumni college offering at my *alma mater* entitled "Vietnam - A Retrospective." The seminar was attended by approximately forty men and women some of whom were Vietnam veterans including army, navy, air force, and marines.

On Wednesday evening, we participants were given the opportunity to share our experiences. It was obvious that many of the veterans had never shared with anyone. They knew what they wanted to say, but were unable to spit it out coherently. After a break in the evening, Shirley was asked to share what it was like for her at home with kids among all the civil tumult going on in the states while her husband was in combat. She represented all of the wives and loved ones who held the fort for us serving abroad. Shirley & I will tour Vietnam with a stop at Tay Ninh and Dau Tieng next February.

The attempts made by the veterans who had never shared convinced me of the wisdom of attending reunions where lies are swapped, stories shared, and the fellowship of brothers-in-arms is manifest provide the perfect venue for healing. If you haven't attended a reunion, register and attend next year's being coordinated by Lis & Larry Young in Paris, Missouri. You'll be doing yourself a favor.

Last month an exhibit came to Richmond entitled "Vietnam Graffiti" which is touring around the country displaying graffiti taken from troop ships carrying soldiers to Vietnam. Although we're about a year away, here's the tentative (subject to change) schedule of activities:

Wednesday, July 7 Bus trip (\$25) to Hannibal, MO, Mark Twain's home town from 7:30 to 5:30 with opportunities for a river boat cruise with lunch (\$25); explore the Mark Twain Cave (\$10); visit seven Mark Twain museums (\$6) with prices per person. Supper and entertainment will be at the reunion site when the bus returns from Hannibal.

Thursday, July 8 - Reunion sign-ins and registration, Welcome by Judge Wilson and our president, Bob Hemphill, and Jerry Dyer from VA who will address the effects of Agent Orange as well as other veteran's benefits. Followed by fellowship, meals, and entertainment in the evening.

Friday, July 9 - Missouri National Guard Helicopters will visit and demonstrate. Friday evening we will have a fish fry for supper.
