Westlake High School near Austin, TX has built an impressive Virtual Vietnam Remembrance website to memorialize those lost in Vietnam (http://virtualvietnam.eanesisd.net.) The project has been underway for at least several years and the number of video memorial tributes is fast approaching 5,000, of the more than 58,000 names that appear on The Vietnam Wall.

Earlier this year, two Westlake High School students reached out for assistance in researching two of our fallen Bravo Brothers: Sgt. Lonnie Lundy (KIA 09/11/68) and Lt. Walter J. Hogans (KIA 10/05/69). The two video tributes are complete and must still be reviewed by faculty advisors. Once the videos are available, I will post links to the videos in our next newsletter.

With nearly 5,000 videos posted already, I used the search engine on the Virtual Vietnam website to see if any other Bravo Brothers have been honored. I found video tributes to seven of our fallen Bravo Brothers already on the site:

I am sure that, like you, the fight at LZ Gold crosses your mind every day. After receiving a copy of the email this morning, I found it necessary to address some misconceptions. (1) There were exactly 51 of our Brothers lost including those lost on the 19th, 21st, and later in hospitals. (2) There were exactly 197 wounded. (3) The only participants in the battle from the 25th were Lt. Col. Vessey plus his Sqt. Major and two quad 50 teams from D-51 Air Artillery 25th ID. That is all for the 25th. (4) Referring to the story and photo in Tropic Lightning about the battle, Westmoreland never saw a camera he didn't like and the idea of the 25th claiming sole credit for winning the battle is incorrect. The 25th members there that morning fought bravely, but so did everyone else. Success has a thousand fathers. Also, the enemy body count of 647 is incorrect. The number 647 was taken from an after-action report written on the afternoon of the 21st. The real and final body count for the Battle of Suoi Tre is 831. This total was developed during the following five days after the battle, when the perimeter at LZ Gold was cleared out 1,000 yards in all directions. The final number of 831 was given to me personally by the CO of 3/4 Air Cav, who provided gunship air support during the battle; he saw the final number on the large engagement board at 25th HQ at Chu Chi. (5) The battle started just after dawn at half-light. The battle ended upon the arrival of relief by 2/12 and 2/22 infantry at 9:08 and 9:14 am respectively. (6) There were 42 Beehive rounds fired that morning by 2/77. Each round was vital to survival. If there was one round that stands out that morning, it wasn't a Beehive at all. It would be the HE round fired by Jim Flynns, B #3. He direct fired one HE round at the Quad 50 that about 20 of the enemy had overrun and had it turned 3/4 of the way to fire on us. WE WOULD HAVE BEEN WIPED OUT RIGHT THEN. (7) Never suggest that any one unit saved the day. The incredible bravery and fight that morning by Bravo Regulars 3/22, Alpha Alphagators and the courage of the two D-71 Quad 50 teams. firing their Quads while their barrels began to warp from heat and their rounds began to corkscrew, can never be overstated. And 2/77 who absolutely exemplified the meaning of being an Artilleryman, and after 11 of our 18 guns were knocked out by the enemy, also experiencing first-hand what it is to be an infantryman. Those of us who actually fought together that morning when Hell touched down at LZ Gold, know with certainty the lines between Infantry and Artillery were blurred. (8) Let those of us who fought the battle, never forget how grateful we were to the 2/12 Infantry, 2/22 Infantry and 2/34 Armor for their determination and risk to get to us just in time that morning. If only our Command would have told us help was coming. Time for me to sign off. Peace to all my Brothers.

Joe, thank you for clearing up the information, and also thank you for your hard work in setting up the memorials held at Ft. Carson. I was honored to attend the very great events to honor those lost during those days. I was interested in the enemy body count being actually 831 instead of 647 taken on March 21, as we cleaned up the area. I know as our 2/12 Recon Platoon patrolled the area out from the base over the next several days, the bodies we found were reported for body count. We also had to search the bodies for maps, etc. and report on uniforms and web gear to the brass that came from Saigon after the battle. If we found some that they had buried to prevent body count, we had to dig them up to search, count and rebury. We were also asked to bring in a sample of web gear they were wearing, not a pleasant task. They only asked for that once, due to the smell. I always wondered if those were counted and added to the mass burial count we did the day of the battle, and as you stated they were counted.

As a USAF FAC, I met many of the surviving heroes of Suoi Tre at the 50th Anniversary of the Battle. I was there and will never forget the mission I flew that morning, as I directed USAF fighters in support of your heroic defense of FSB Gold. I also learned more about the two USAF FACs who lost their lives at Suoi Tre. Their heroism had been unrecognized officially by the military, and I joined an effort to correct the record. In the process, I made the acquaintance of Walt Shugart, Bravo Company CO, as he and others helped prepare an appeal on behalf of the families of the FACs. Walt and I spoke about the details of the battle, and he wrote a letter to the Secretary of the Air Force to accompany our written appeal for consideration. I have an electronic copy of his brief letter if you would like it for your unit history. As we got to know one another's battle stories, we realized we had most likely been in radio contact as the battle erupted. Eventually, Walt opened up about his ongoing battle with cancer, and we exchanged our personal faith stories. Although our contacts were sparse over those months, they were very meaningful. I think of Walt as a friend. Our last exchange was on October 10. Walt was in hospice. He died October 28, 2017. Since the battle took place on the Tuesday of Holy Week, 1967, I thought it might be meaningful on this Holy Week Tuesday to the men who served with Walt to read a line from one of his emails to me: "God is a verb whose love encompasses all and is not at all bound by denomination". If there is a reunion next year in Dallas, I hope to be invited. The DFW metroplex has been my home for 43 years. I have your website in my "target" list.

To all, I am pleased to see so much information and contact about the Suoi Tre battle being discussed. I, along with Bill King (2/22 Infantry) have worked hard to keep the memory of those lost in the battle alive. Each year we work with the COs of the 2/12 Infantry and 2/77 FA to hold a memorial service. Some of the casualties happened on March 19th as that is credited as the start of the battle. The 2/77th has a Regimental room that covers from 1919. On one wall is a collage done by Bill King and his wife, Janice, that has a picture of all those killed during the battle, with all the information of rank and metals earned in the battle. Also, we have a bell with all the names engraved on it. Each year we hold a Memorial Service supported by the 2nd Inf. Bde., 4th Inf. Div. and the 2 BNs on active duty—2/12 Inf. BN and 2/77th FA BN on March 20. This year we put things on hold until it is safe to hold the service. We try to get the word out and invite as many as want to attend to come and join with us for the Memorial Service. We get a lot of people to attend who were not in the battle but want to show support to our Military Family.

This is addressed to those I have sought out regarding the Battle of FSB Crook in efforts to assist the Vietnamese with the graves there. After nearly two years of research and seeking out veterans of the June 5/6, 1969 battle, there is movement afoot in Vietnam to explore the larger of the gravesites. Commencing June 10, the local military command will begin the exploration of the area. Three digs are planned. Below is a recent article (Google translation) from a VN online newspaper about a Vietnamese veteran's memory of the battle written prior to the now planned exploration. # The attack of the 88th Regiment liberation on the military branch and the American artillery battle at the junction of Bay, Tay Ninh

For many years, Mr. Nguyen Van Kieu resided in Sam Son district, Thanh Hoa province, always concerned about 323 comrades of E88 and E2 units of F9 buried in a collective bomb pit, until now more than 50 years has not been brought to the martyrs cemetery to enjoy the smoke like other martyrs.

Terrible night June 6 and 7, 1969. Mr. Kieu enlisted in the army on June 22, 1968, was staffed to C-15-F338, in Quang Duc commune, Quang Xuong district, Thanh Hoa. After months of training, I marched to the South and went to B 2075 (Western Thanh Hoa). At the end of March 1969, he was assigned to C20 E88 (Tu Vu) - F9, based in Tay Ninh. He participated in the first battle at Dong Ban airport, Tan Bien district—Tay Ninh, a battle he will never forget. In his memory, on June 6/7, 1969, the 2nd Regiment of the 9th Division attacked but could not access the on-duty soldiers who sacrificed much. On the night of the 6th, the 88th Regiment (Tu Vu) broke through the second fence and it was revealed, at that time at 10:40 Mr. Kinh Hien—Regimental Chief of Staff along with 9th Battalion and 2 sapper platoons were brave overcoming the barriers, the remainder proceeds straight into the battlefield. The 8th battalion ambushed and

attacked reinforcements to capture the air. North of Highway 13, about 700m from the center of the battlefield to the northeast. At this time the US military aircraft dropped flares, with 4 flares continuously dropping, as bright as day. The barracks and bridge blocks of the American troops started firing, our troops were still close to the battlefield. By 11 o'clock the AK, B40, B41 also promote all firepower, fire bullets on both sides red a corner of the Gulf Junction. At 11:30 there are 5 flat fish helicopters circling around the battlefield, then two shot down where our troops are fighting. At that time, our 12ly7 Battle of the Northwest began firing on five airplanes, 5 soared to avoid 12.7ly bullets, and all 5 helicopters launched missiles to the battlefield. 12ly7, our troops promoted fire less than 20 minutes. Artillery rigs of the US Army nearly 20 guns, 2 sapper platoons are not deep, lined, destroy most of the attack, until 12pm to rescue the US army was attacked by our troops, Display at the place poured around the battlefield, our army also sacrificed much. At 5 am, the US troops poured out to cover the outside circle, our troops just fought the inside troops, both against the outside troops, and took the wounded soldiers out, the battle was extremely fierce. At 8 am, the US Army again reinforces its second wave of troops at Dong Du base, a company used by helicopter to rush down Route 13, close to the base to the Northeast, until 9 am. The enemy swept into the regimental area where Mr. Drama was sitting to watch the phone. Mr. Hien, battalion commander of 8th battalion, telephoned Mr. Drama to be ready to fight but at that time Mr. Gun was not available, regiment officials like Mr. Ti and Mr. Can withdrew at 8:20 am. Overlooking Bai Chuong in front of us, the US Army came closer and closer, only about 130m and 100m away. Suddenly a reconnaissance platoon appeared, our AK guns exploded violently. Next is the AK R15, the bin bursts, AR15 bullets flew past the ears but did not hit any bullets. A few more Americans collapsed outside of Bai Che, the fighting was less than 20 minutes before it ended. The fighting point was only about 200m to the northeast. At 10:30, there were two planes, a long one and a small plane, hovering around the island and then rocketing into the nearby forests to clear the vard and then both beams to take the soldiers to fly to Saigon. When marching from northern Truong Son to South Truong Son was extremely arduous, when it came to fighting, it was even more arduous, from the Eastern battlefield to the Cambodian battlefield and then marched to the Western battlefield. In the long nights of rain all of our teammates rained badly, each of them took a breath to warm up and continued to march, in the hardships and sacrifices of the soldiers without any pen. In the battle of the Gulf junction, An Co commune, Chau Thanh district—Tay Ninh province, American veteran Richard and his teammates provided information, the number of soldiers sacrificing them buried in a pit, bombs in the north east of Vinh bridge are about 100-110m, on the north side of road 13 are about 40-50m and two small holes are on the south of the road. His teammates ate a tray, lay in the same cellar, when in the battle, they lived and died together, the injured were allowed to go back to the North, to integrate into life, in the social community, while remaining 323 dongs, lice of E88 and E2, F9 buried a bomb crater for more than 50 years but have not been to the martyrs cemetery to enjoy the smoke with his teammates, is what Mr. Drama always worries. He expected the authorities to make plans soon, so that 323 martyrs as his comrades were taken to the cemetery, which is what he always worried when his age was no longer healthy. In early March 2020, due to his advanced age, his family did not rest assured that he would return to the old battlefield alone, his son went with his father to Tay Ninh to reexamine the location and find the tomb of teammate Pham Van. Ngu and Mr. K Drama were hit by Claymo mines on the evening of May 19 1973, when he woke up, his comrades said comrade Ngu died and buried on the banks of the border, far from Ta Nu ferry wharf in Khanh Hung commune, Vinh Hung district is about 200m. Currently, two American veterans who have participated in the burial of323 martyrs have provided coordinates for Mr. Nguyen Van Kich, so now those who are alive as he is trying to contact each other to coordinate in collaboration with the authorities, the 323 remains of soldiers who were his teammates were soon taken to the cemetery to be smoked like other martyrs.
